DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- 1. The graveyard in *It Found Us* has a reputation for being haunted. Are there any places like that in your city or town? Why do people think it's haunted?
- 2. Hazel loves solving mysteries and says she has a "puzzle brain." Do you have any hobbies or skills that make you happy?
- 3. During the book, Hazel's opinion of her parents seems to change. She becomes more understanding. Why do you think that is?
- 4. Den feels guilty for what happened to his best friend, Everett. Have you ever felt guilty for something, and if so, how did you fix it?
- 5. Hazel and Den's relationship changes over the course of the book. Why do you think that is, and are there any signs that they might be kinder to each other in the future?
- 6. Den believes Everett was taken from the graveyard from the very beginning. Hazel eventually believes that, too. What evidence makes them both come to that conclusion?
- 7. Maggie, Den, and Hazel have very different personalities, but they all have strengths that help them solve the case. What are those strengths?
- 8. Which character in *It Found Us* is most like you and why?
- 9. Why does Hazel change the name of her podcast at the end?
- 10. At the beginning of the book, Hazel does not feel the adults in her life take her seriously. Have you ever felt that way? How did you handle it?
- 11. If you could ask any of the characters in *It Found Us* a question, who and what would it be?
